

Our Reading Spine has been compiled using the Pie Corbett Reading Spine, Doug Lemov's Reading Spine and our own choices from research into 'must-read' children's books. The selection of books within our reading spine provides exposure to a wealth of acclaimed classic and modern authors and poets as well as a range of writing styles.

In the Early Years, children have opportunities for reading throughout the day, exploring traditional tales and Nursery Rhymes and enjoying a range of high-quality picture books. In Years 1-6, there are planned opportunities throughout the day for independent reading in addition to a daily phonics or reading comprehension lesson and a daily story time session.

Each classroom has its own reading area and each Key Stage has an outdoor 'Reading Retreat' for children to relax with a book at playtime. Within our reading areas, we have a wide range of books in genre collections and have recently purchased many recommended reads. In addition, each year group has their own author collection.

To motivate and inspire our pupils to read widely, we have challenges and rewards to encourage them to develop a knowledge of authors, genres and, of course, ultimately develop a lifelong love of reading!





Our core picture books are from Pie Corbett's Reading Spine – a selection of carefully chosen texts for nursery children. The books in our reading selection are almost all very repetitive. This makes them easier for children to join in with so that the reading experience can be interactive. In each book, there is much to discuss so that children understand the vocabulary as well as what is happening. It is important to discuss the pictures as much as the text. After a while, the children will know each story word for word, which can give great confidence to early readers.




